# PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It has been a whirlwind of a season that has presented plenty of challenges and curveballs, but at the same time it's also presented plenty of learning, growth and opportunities.

However, before I get into this I'd like to revisit the 2017 AGM where we had two legends of ESFA step down from the Board after a solid innings as ESFA Treasurer Mark Puterflam and ESFA President Sean Fenton. This is as good a time as any to acknowledge Mark and Sean's tremendous contribution to the Association and we cannot thank them enough for gifting their valuable time and knowledge. Thank you again.

There were many worthy questions, concerns and discussions raised at the 2017 AGM, one being the need for a full Board to be assembled for the 2018 season. It gives me great pleasure to say this goal was well and truly met, having old and new faces around the table gave the table a wealth of experience, as well fresh insight and a different way of looking at the broad spectrum of ESFA football.

**John Harris, Treasurer** - John has been a member of the ESFA Board since 2017 as Director overseeing the judiciary process. John plays football within ESFA and his knowledge of the ESFA landscape as well as his legal wisdom is of great value to ESFA.

Andrew Field, Director of Technical Development and Coaching - Andrew has held this portfolio for 9

years and his expertise is second to none.

Jaleh Shafie, Director Senior Football - Jaleh has been an ESFA Board member since 2016 and her extensive knowledge of the community of ESFA senior football is a valuable asset to the Board.

**Julia Chernoukha, Director Junior Football** - Julia was appointed by the Board in April 2018, ensuring the Board positions were all filled and bringing her vast knowledge of junior football landscape.

lan Robinson, Director MiniRoos – lan was appointed by the Board in late 2017 to the MiniRoos portfolio. lan's extensive involvement in MiniRoos football for many years is paramount to move ESFA forward.

**Roy Belcher, Director** - Roy Belcher is an ESFA stalwart inducted into the ESFA Hall of Fame. Roy's understanding of ESFA history and football is an invaluable resource. Roy has assisted in the referees and facilities area in 2018.

**Richard Baldwin, Director** - Richard brings his experience in the running of SAFL and his knowledge of ESFA football to the table, as well as overseeing the Judiciary process in 2018.

Thank you to all of you for being a solid Board and supporting me whilst I found my feet and purpose.

Like any new role I go into, whether it be professional or personal. I like to observe and watch nature take its course. There is nothing like wading into the waters to find out that it is croc infested! After 4-5 weeks of the season getting under way, the same old things were rearing their ugly head; not enough referees, grounds, competition fixtures not out in time, poor communication, Competition Rules being manipulated, unclear processes & procedures, poor systems, ground fees, what does the office do, and the merry go round council meetings etc.

These topics are all things that have presented themselves over and over for the past few years. Its like that age old saying "Nothing changes, if nothing changes".

It was clear to me what my purpose was and what we needed to do as a Board. We needed to find a different way of doing things in order to get the results that the clubs are looking for, as it was obvious that things were not evolving the way they should be. It was agreed that we needed to find why we were not achieving these requirements and so we invested time into finding a company that could review the Association in its entirety. A few individuals were proposed but for various reasons they were unable to support. One Company was found suitable but later deemed the cost was too much to invest.

Not one to be deterred from completing this task, two of the Board members and I, formed a small strategy group. We agreed that a questionnaire be produced and we go direct to the clubs and find out what the clubs were thinking about the various areas of the Association. (On a side note it was a shame that a handful of clubs didn't respond back, nothing can be achieved if we are not all on the same page and kicking the ball in the same direction). The great news is we received some valuable insight to what the current climate is and what the expectations are for the

Association to achieve.

We also held a Presidents meeting whilst unveiling our new Association partnership with Ultra Football. At this meeting, the acquisition of information we had picked up was presented and Presidents were asked what ideas they had to help improve the 2019 season. It was great to see a number of Presidents holding discussions among themselves with sharing great ideas and best practice. It was humbling to see our football community working as one, and something I intend to do more of.

The information & ideas from the President meeting and questionnaire will be reviewed further by the Strategy Group, and then later presented to the rest of the Board to prioritise the top 2 or 3 from each category. These objectives will be given to the General Manager and his team, to formulate a clear business plan on achieving expectations for the 2019 Season.

This will give clear focal points on what we, as an organisation and clubs, need to commit to and prioritise. The only difference here, is that we will not continue to do the same thing over and over again and hope for a different result. It is key that each club, its board, its members whether they just want to turn up and play or support from the sidelines, everyone needs to know they play a vital role in making this business plan a success and that it just doesn't sit on the shoulders of the Board & office to achieve.

Whilst this was being conducted, in the background we had some great achievements with new faces joining the team, numerous awards being achieved. We welcomed Richard Beazley and Dale Quartey in the office team, as Referees Coordinator and Miniroos Coordinator. Caroline Oakes Ash was promoted to Competitions Coordinator as well as holding onto her Communications & Disciplinary roles as well (is there anything this woman can't do?).

We saw a number of success happen this season of which my fellow Board members will share with you later in this report, but to name a couple of stand







out performances, our Coogee Mens Championship side take out the ESFA Cup, League, Grand Finals and Champions of Champions along with Dunbar Rovers FC 035's and Ladies Championship also bringing home Champion of Champions titles as well. Our Association had the most victories at this year's Champion of Champions, a great result for football in the Eastern Suburbs. Coogee United AAM1 also reached the final of the State Cup, narrowly missing out the title in extra time.

I am extremely proud of our ESFA women, Jaleh Shafie (Director), Julia Chernoukha (Director), Sarah Ferris (Womens Chair) and Caroline Oakes-Ash (Staff), who have been selected as Community Bid Champions to endorse the FFA in their FIFA Womens World Cup 2023 bid. I hope that all our ESFA members support and get behind our Community Bid Champions in their quest.

Our MiniRoos Gala Days for our 6s and 7s proved extremely successful. Thank you to all involved in these exciting days, albeit it very exhausting for club volunteers on the grounds. Pagewood G12s, U14s and Dunbar U15s reached the Quarter Finals of the Champion of Champions which was a huge success for Association junior football. ESFA now have over 200 accredited coaches and our 2019 Coaching Courses and programs will see this number rise, ensuring ESFA kids (and adults) are coached under the FFA Curriculum. Football from U6s through to O45s has been provided with the resources necessary to ensure the continuing success of our Association.

In closing, to the ESFA Board and Committees, thank you for giving up your time and effort. The Board is one such group of people who undertake this role due to their love of the game and community, thank you dearly for your support.

To the General Manager and his amazing team who are continuously in the trenches and ready to go at a moments notice when the going gets tough, thank you for making the season what it is and look forward to working with you next season.

To our referees its by no means the easiest job to do, but you continue to turn up week in and week out ensuring a fair game can be played. Without a ref you have organised chaos. We all need to realise that we need to respect this crucial part of our beautiful game otherwise we will continue to struggle as an Association and never move the game forward.

Lastly I would like to thank all those that are involved, to you, to your club and your board, the members that choose to play under ESFA. To the Sponsors, RTO"s, Coaches, Players and Volunteers who

> all play a part in keeping this Association alive and thriving, thank you.

I hope you enjoyed this season and I look forward to welcoming you back for the 2019 season.

# **GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT**

It is my pleasure to report to our members once more, with a year of colour and movement having washed over us.

We started the year with Summer Football having grown from around 20 teams in late 2016 to over 60 teams in 2017, showing we were onto a good thing!

At last year's AGM, we farewelled Sean Fenton from the Presidency and Mark Puterflam from the Treasurer's role. At the close of nominations before the Annual General Meeting, there were no nominees to replace these men nor to fill the Juniors and MiniRoos director position. The remaining Directors set to work to fill the casual vacancies that arose and build the Board back up.

The result has been a Board that, under the leadership of President Scott Sadler, is diverse and energetic. We have Directors with a huge range of experience and exposure in the game ensuring that there are various perspectives brought to every debate and a determination to look after all aspects of the game. I'd like to thank the Board for their ongoing care and stewardship of the Association.

In the office, just prior to Christmas, we also bade farewell to long time Competitions Coordinator Adrian Larson, who accepted a role at NSW Rugby Union. We were fortunate that Caroline Oakes-Ash was willing to bring her experience in the Association from the Referees Coordinator role across to the Competitions role. Jaime Gomez continued in his role as Technical Director, and we were joined by Dale Quartey as MiniRoos Coordinator and Richard Beazley as Referees Coordinator.

We now have an office with very significant experience in football at a range of levels, from local clubs and Associations to the FFA and national teams. We have a team of 'doers' and problem solvers, which is great because there's always a lot to do, and there are always problems to solve. I give my thanks to the whole team - we have looked after one another this year and worked harmoniously to deliver a good year of football. For 2019, everyone will be a year wiser and more battle-hardened, so we'll be ready to roll from day 1.

An Association like ours has a lot of moving parts - we cover everything from 5-year-olds playing their first 4v4 games to Championship sides winning Champions of Champions trophies to 70-year-olds knocking about in the Over-45s and young stars in the making in our development programs. We have more than 5,000 games a year for more than 9,000 registered participants, with competitions running for 40 weeks out of 52. If we're not running a competition we're setting one up.



Our Clubs have once again been sensational, working hard to sign the players up, sort the shirts, pump up balls and put up nets so players get out on our parks.

We have challenges - there is growing competition from private academies out there willing to run competitions outside the football family for private profit. These for-profit providers picked up a significant number of players from ESFA Clubs this year; we need to make sure that ESFA Clubs are equipped to fight back.

There is the difficulty of ensuring ambitious players and parents know what their options are inside the football family and ensuring that players who want extra coaching can get it from qualified coaches and for a reasonable price. We also need to find our way in pathway programs and ensure that players and coaches are given the opportunity to compete at the level that the highest level that their aspirations and ability allow.

We have challenges to ensure our competitions are run as smoothly and as efficiently as possible - we are making some Rules amendments to sort out some pain points and we are hoping to be able to adopt new registration and competition management systems in 2019 that will be more user-friendly for players, coaches, managers and administrators.

With a united Board of Directors, dedicated office staff and a determined army of club volunteers, we are ready to meet these challenges head on to make 2019 the best year yet for the Eastern Suburbs Football Association.

# FINANCIAL REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2018

# TREASURER'S REPORT

Dear Members,

Whilst sustaining its first deficit in seven years, the 2018 financial results have again delivered on the ESFA Board's aims of providing the services required by ESFA's member clubs effectively, delivering to our members excellent value for money, and ensuring that these are achieved in an environment of financial responsibility.

In 2018 ESFA and the Board has continued to build on the sound platform that has been developed over the past seven years.

In an attempt to hold down the cost of registrations, at the end of 2017 ESFA decided to absorb the rise in insurance costs passed on from FNSW. The final cost of this decision was significant and is summarised in the following table:

2018 also saw a significant and unanticipated fall in registration numbers which were as follows:

The cost of falling registrations to ESFA's balance sheet was:

Each of these matters was sufficient to bring the budget into deficit. However, the combination of the absorption of increase insurance costs and reduction in player numbers resulted in the following changes:

# Key 2018 Financial Highlights

- 1. ESFA returned a deficit of \$24,266 for the 2018 financial year. This is the first deficit result since 2012.
- 2. Revenues (ex pass-throughs for referees and Football NSW affiliation fees) were strongly down on the prior year, largely driven by the combination of absorbing increased registration costs from FNSW and falling registered player numbers, especially in MiniRoos
- 3. Expenditure (ex pass-throughs for referees and affiliation fees to Football NSW) was also lower in the 2018 season, but the reduction was not enough to prevent the Association from recording a deficit.


4. Net Assets at 30 September 2018 were \$285,379. This is 33% of our annual expenses (ex pass-throughs) and is in line with our target for net assets to be at least 30% of our annual expenses (ex pass-throughs).


5. Receivables and payables were at expected levels at 30 September 2018, and the the Ground Development Fund is in excess of \$540,000 after 7 years, providing a substantial sum to be applied to appropriate opportunities as they arise.

# Underlying strong financial position


In 2018 the Board and management of ESFA has continued its policy of prudent financial management which began under the direction of the previous President and my predecessor Treasurer. The work of the Board in the past 6 years has put ESFA in a sound financial position.



Whilst in 2018 we recorded a deficit, it is against a backdrop of a strong underlying financial position. We have built up our balance sheet so we have net assets of at least 30% of our annual expenditure minus passthroughs. Whilst we have posted a narrow deficit this year, our position remains strong.



As can be seen below, in 2018 ESFA saw player numbers ease back from 2017's record high, but they remain at historically high levels - higher than any year prior to 2016:



The drop in the number of registered players in 2018 is largely due to the weak numbers in MiniRoos. Youth (12-18) player numbers in ESFA were at an all-time high of 1,704 players in the 2018 season.

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act New South Wales. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

### a) Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the entity is exempt from income tax under Section 50-45 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

### b) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

### c) Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

### d) Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the entity reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the income statement.

### e) **Employee Benefits**

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee benefits have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

# Note 1: Statement of Accounting Policies (continued)

### f) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

# Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

### h) Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

### i) Goods and Services Tax

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented in the cash flow statement on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

### j) Comparative Figures

When required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.

# New accounting standards for application in future periods

AASB 16: Leases (applicable to annual reporting periods commencing on or after 1 January 2019).

When effective, this standard will replace the current accounting requirements applicable to leases in AASB 117: Leases and related Interpretations, AASB 16 introduces a single lessee accounting model that eliminates the requirement for leases to be classified as operating or finance leases.

# Note 1: Statement of Accounting Policies (continued)

New accounting standards for application in future periods (continued)

The main changes introduced by the new standard are as follows:

- recognition of a right-of-use asset and liability for all leases (excluding short-term leases with less than 12 months of tenure and leases relating to low-value
- depreciation of right-of-use assets in line with AASB 116: Property, Plant and Equipment in profit or loss and unwinding of the liability in principal and interest components;
- inclusion of variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate in the initial measurement of the lease liability using the index or rate at the commencement date;
- application of a practical expedient to permit a lessee to elect not to separate nonlease components and instead account for all components as a lease; and
- inclusion of additional disclosure requirements.

The transitional provision of AASB 16 allow a lessee to either retrospectively apply the standard to comparatives in line with AASB 108: Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors or recognise the cumulative effect of retrospective application as an adjustment to opening equity on the date of initial application.

Although members of the committee anticipate that the adoption of AASB 16 will impact the association's financial statements, it is impracticable at this stage to provide a reasonable estimate of such impact.

# TECHNICAL DEVELOPMENT AND COACHING AND TECHNICAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT

ESFA delivered another successful year of coach education across the Eastern Suburbs during 2018, through the delivery of community coaching courses.

This season, courses were conducted in two formats, being formal community coach education courses or community workshops. ESFA saw a total of 216 coaches attend formal community coaching courses, run at either centralised ESFA locations, or hosted by our member Clubs. Further to this, ESFA conducted community workshops at member Clubs and conducted 'model' FFA curriculum-based training sessions for approximately 130 coaches.

Courses and workshops focused on the younger age groups being U6-U12s, were the most popular

and involved a mix of parent lead coaches and community coaches. Along with the many Grassroots and Skills Training Certificates, ESFA incorporated the 'Game Leader' component to assist coaches, parents and game leaders in game day management and expectations of their role. This helped ESFA reinforce why we encourage certain structure for our Miniroos, along with basic rules and understanding of the game, which further assisted with player learning. There is still some work to do however, to further encourage coaches and team leaders to follow the spirit and rules







of MiniRoos, to assist in creating an environment for development and learning. It is the responsibility of our team leaders along with the parents, to not only do this for their own team, but to ensure the opposition team also has an enjoyable experience.

Planning for community coaching courses during 2019 has begun and ESFA looks forward to providing more opportunities for coaches to further develop their skills and understanding. Special thanks to Oscar Gonzalez, FNSW Coach Education Manager, and Andrew Morris, Easts FC - FNSW coach educator, for their assistance, guidance and support throughout the 2018.

Late 2017, ESFA once again ran the FFA/AFC C-Licence Youth Licence as part of the Advanced Coaching Pathway. Coaches from within our area participated and we look forward to assisting these coaches gain experience and knowledge to assist in their environment. Better coaches, better footballers. This course has been a major success for our area and we look forward to working with FNSW/FFA to continue deliver another one in the near future.

There is no doubt that technical ability of players in the Eastern Suburbs has improved over the years, and this has been evident across all our parks during the season. It is clear that coaches, through the assistance of their clubs and our coach development courses, are delivering more enjoyable, skills-based sessions which intern are helping our players develop their skills and more importantly love of the game. Thank you to all those coaches, managers, parents and team leaders that have helped create this for our young players.

Our Skills Acquisition Program (SAP) in 2018 was again rated in the top third of programs in the state by former Socceroo and SAP assessor, Paul Wade. Players throughout the year developed their level of skill and understanding of the game through the delivery of the FFA National Curriculum. Under the guidance of our SAP Technical Director, Greg Kokoviadis, and our experienced coaches across our mixed and girls' program, players enjoyed a successful season playing against the best players in our State. Some notable performances led to several players being selected to represent the Met East team at the recent State Titles. These players, Milly Boughton (U12 Girls), Ruby Reid (U12 Girls) and Mia Mastoris (U14 Girls) represented ESFA in a very high regard and we should all be very proud of them. Thank you to our clubs for the continued support given to the Skill Acquisition Program and we look forward to the

As part of our growth and alignment for pathways for our players, ESFA will continue to explore options to align ourselves with Football NSW competitions that expand to the Youth league levels for both boys and girls. ESFA is committed to ensuring all our players are given the opportunity that meet their level of skill.

Finally, thank you to the ESFA staff and Board, in particular Dr. Andrew Field, for their support and commitment to delivering our programs.

Looking forward to continue working with our club and their coaches in 2019 and seeing our sport develop throughout the year.

# MINIROOS FOOTBALL COORDINATOR'S REPORT

2018 has been a great year within the MiniRoos. From a personal standpoint, it's been brilliant to get out on the fields, meet some of the parents and watch some magnificent football, all the way through from the U6's to the U12 noncompetitive.

I have also taken the opportunity to visit some other Associations to understand how they run their MiniRoos programs and information share, so we can continue to offer a product we can all be proud of. Overall, our competition is certainly very robust, and you can all be assured that we will continue to review the situation to make improvements where we see fit.

Starting with our U6's and U7's the roving hub has continued to be a success, based on positive feedback from the Clubs. We had 23 teams at the commencement of season and a big shout out to Glebe Wanderers for providing a 24th team to ensure there were no byes in the competition. As with previous years, the hub was well supported and the atmosphere at the grounds, is in no doubt due to the excellent attitude of parents and spectators, as well as the host clubs who were always so well organised.

We were very lucky to not have a single game washed out due to rain and the conditions of the fields were very good throughout the 17 weeks of the 2018 season.

Our Gala Days were well attended and continued to grow throughout the year, culminating in our final Gala Day of the season, being our biggest of the year with 106 different teams participating. We are hoping that we see these numbers increase in 2019 as we aim for 100%











club participation in every Gala Day provided.

Outside of the Roving Hub, our U8 - U12 appeared to have an enjoyable season. The continued use of time slots worked well and ensured that everyone knew when they were playing each weekend.

Our girls competition on a Sunday saw some inspiring football and it's upliftingly impressive to see so many girls playing football.

The biggest downfall of the girls which will be rectified for 2019, was no specific time slots. These currently do not sit within our Competition Rules and to help with consistency and organization, they will be implemented.

It appeared that all teams were playing to the MiniRoos rules and any questions were brought to ESFA through myself or the Technical Director, were quickly resolved. The plan for 2019 is to distribute a one-page sheet MiniRoos Rules sheet to the clubs, to pass on to guardians to ensure all participating in the sport as players and spectators are aware of the format of MiniRoos matches.









Two disappointing aspects of the season, was firstly, the amount of forfeits against those who play on Sunday from other Saturday teams. It is appreciated that this can be an inconvenience however, considering the continued drive for inclusion within society, we would like to see the pattern of forfeits reduced in 2019.

The second aspect, has been some issues regarding poor sideline behavior. It's imperative that we all remember that MiniRoos is not competitive, with the basis around teaching children the core skills of football, that will also help to stand them in good stead in later life. We all have a role to play in this and poor spectator behaviour is something that we will not and should not as a community of football, tolerate in 2019.

Thank you to the support of Ian Robinson who has been the MiniRoos Director, sitting on the Board ensuring that the tough decisions are made. Thank you also to the ESFA office team for welcoming me into the fold and guiding me throughout my first season.

I hope that everyone has an enjoyable off season and I look forward to seeing you all back next year.

# JUNIOR FOOTBALL DIRECTOR'S REPORT

This season was my first year of involvement with the ESFA Board as the Junior Football Director.

Having stepped into this role after an extensive background in Junior Football over the last 15+ years, it was important to put those experiences on the other side of the table to use. My main goals for this year, were to create a little more unity within Junior Clubs and give them the power to make decisions about Junior Football, as they are the ones on the ground each week doing the hard yards.

Junior Football was first off the mark, to conduct a series of feedback from all Clubs. There was written feedback given and face to face meetings conducted with Clubs. It is important to understand each Club's needs, as they are all very different and understand how we can all move forward and work together to improve Junior Competitions in our area.

Main areas of review are competition structures (ie: fixed time slots), grading (better process), planning in advance (will be helped by fixed time slots), facility utilisation and referee allocation improvements. What is truly key to everyone's feedback, is the lack of unity between our clubs themselves and ESFA, and the clubs.



This is a gradual process and I hope we can all work together to improve this further.

We have again seen strong numbers coming through the MiniRoos in both boys and girls. The trend of drop in numbers in the 14-16 age groups continues and we have begun discussions about how we try and turn this around. Strategies will be put in place in Season 2019, to retain players aligned to private school, other sport commitments and the existence of multiple pathway programs in the area which risks dilution of the Competitions.

This year we have seen no wet weather adversely affecting competition. This is almost unheard of; therefore, it was a full year of football for all our juniors. The introduction of a reduced school holiday period was a success to allow longer Competitions. Again, we are constantly working on strategies to avoid any game delays, cancellation and forfeits moving forward and ways to introduce more football. The introduction of fixed times slots in 2019 and possibility of mid-week games in some age groups, will see more flexibility within our Junior Competitions and again, encourage more football for all.

ESFA continues to update and process rule changes agreed and accepted by clubs every year. For Season 2019, we will be focusing on amendments, forfeits, player ID process and tightening of rules in general to avoid any animosity amongst the clubs. The rules will be clear and there will be no multiple meaning or interpretations.

This year was a big year of review of our Pathways. It was agreed by clubs that they would like to see an ESFA Pathways in Juniors, to expand the current SAP programs in boys and girls. This is a very positive step forward and we hope to work on this concept as a unified group in 2019. This will require some consolidation of current pathways programs run by clubs in the area already. All clubs will need to buy into this concept. Leadership within ESFA will be important for us to be able to secure crucial Junior Boys and Girls spots in Football NSW competitions in 2020.







I believe we have made improvements this year and implemented some good things in Competitions. Next year we will focus on more improvements and your support is very crucial. Change takes time and resistance is always a hurdle we must face. Our clubs come in different sizes, different requirements and expectations, as well as priorities. It is finding common ground and steering the boat in the same direction which will make ESFA a successful Junior Football community in the future.

Congratulations to all Junior Teams for the performance and representing ESFA in such good spirit at the Champions of Champions. Special mention to Dunbar Rovers U15s and Pagewood Botany FC G12s and U14s, for progressing through to quarter finals. We are very proud of your efforts.

I would like to thank Aaron Dibdin and Caroline Oakes-Ash for their support this year and welcoming me as Junior Football Director. Specifically, Caroline, whom I worked close with through the year. Caroline's hard work and resilience is to be admired in her 1st year in the role as Competitions Manager and my thanks is given to her, for going above and beyond, to actually perform 2 roles at the start of the year, covering the Referees area.

Lastly, thank you to the Clubs, their officials, players and parents. Without our wonderful volunteers a lot of the brilliant things that we make happen for the kids, would not be possible.

Thank you also to the referees and all the work they put in each season.

I hope we see a return of 100% of players for 2019 and then some.

## SENIOR FOOTBALL DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Our 2018 winter season was played at the same as 2018 FIFA World Cup games. The football fever was certainly high around the country, over 3M viewers watched the Australia's World Cup matches and pulled in some of the biggest TV audiences on record of TV ratings compared to previous tournaments.











Within our own multicultural Football community, many of our teams/players made the World Cup trip to Russia. There were many social gathering to watch the games, many interesting conversations at our parks and many" sleepy faces" at the early morning kick off time of 9:00am, due to watching games in the wee hours of the morning. Once more we were reminded, why football is the most popular and loved sport in the world.

Our 2018 senior competition has been both fulfilling and challenging. We all enjoyed some great football and again very few interruptions from the rain. When it rained, we were ready for rescheduling the majority of our washed-out games utilizing our set aside Wet Weather Weekends.

Our office and SMFC were faced with number of difficulties commencing from early in the season, through to almost end of the season. Late team nominations, late withdrawals, forfeits, deferrals and late regrading requests, resulted in some reshuffling within some divisions and re-drawing of the fixtures along with adjustment of points etc, to ensure the fairest possible competitions for all involved. The ESFA team worked very hard to overcome the problems with the least disruptions as possible, to affected divisions.

Through an innumerable amount of discussions, we have come up with some recommendations and solutions to eliminate/prevent our 2018 operational hitches which hopefully will bring us better more enjoyable competitions for all. Clubs can help our office and our volunteers at ESFA level to run a smoother operation, by respecting our rules and to be more vigilant with grading of their players and their teams to ensure more balanced competitions.





#### **WOMEN'S FOOTBALL**

Historically, numbers in the Womens group vary from year to year, so it is always a waiting game to see how many divisions we can form. This year we were fortunate to have 39 teams (up by 3 compared to 2017) and were able to form five divisions.

ESFA were unable to gain the numbers for our G18 competition but we were able to combine the G18s with our all age women divisions. This added some challenging and exciting games to our senior women competitions.

A number of our more experienced and older players approached us about the possibility of bring back our 030/35 women competition. Our answer to this is ESFA has never given up on this idea, every year we do offer nominations in this age specific Womens Comp however, we have been unable to get the numbers required for a competition, in the last few years. The possibility/ideas of combining with other neighbouring Associations has been suggested and investigated with no or little, success. I do not see any harm to try this approach again in the future for O30/35 women competition though strong analysis of feasibilities and finding the correct Association partner, is required. We are also hoping Louise Mazzarolli Cup - O30 women event which is scheduled for early Feb 2019 will be a step toward rejuvenating this division in the future.

Congratulations to all our female participants this season and for wonderful display of sportsperson ship during the season, Grand Finals, ESFA cup/Trophy, State Cup and Champion of Champions matches.





#### **MENS FOOTBALL**

#### **SATURDAY**

Our Saturday AA Men Saturday competition, continued to be very stable with 29 teams competing in three divisions. Our men continue to enjoy their Saturday football. We witness a high level of football in these competitions and we see no reason that Saturday football numbers will slow down.

Congratulations to all our participants, Premiers and Champions.

**AA Mens Championship** began their season with 11 teams. Unfortunately, Dunbar had difficulties maintaining numbers in their squad. Early in the season, we were still uncertain if they would be able to participate in the League. We planned contingency fixtures for a 10 team AA Mens Championship in case of a need. Despite the many efforts by the club, SMFC and the Office, on April 19, Dunbar Men Championship squad removed themselves from 2018 competition.

The future of AAMC is still being discussed. There are different thoughts and ideas as to how this Competition should be structured in the future. Yet, these ideas have not been fully formed into a coherent and accepted approach by the Clubs, the SFMC, the ESFA office or the ESFA Board.

We proposed that participating Clubs appoint a MC subcommittee, with SFMC including Competitions Coordinator, to consult this subcommittee heavily, to get a better pulse from Clubs. Men championship Forum already has been initiated by SMFC, inviting all clubs with interest in this competition. We believe this will be a positive move for the future of our MC league.

Meanwhile, SMFC and the ESFA office are working on the 2019 plan for this Competition. The preparations are being placed, to assure all participants, we have a solid plan for next season.

I would like to thank all the participating Clubs, the office and the Board for their support and enthusiasm with particular matter.

Congratulations to the winners of First Grade, Coogee United and Reserve Grade, Glebe Gorillas. Both clubs securing the Premiers and Champions titles.

#### **COMPETITIONS COORDINATOR REPORT**

This season, my seventh with ESFA, saw my role change from Referees Coordinator to Competitions Coordinator.

While excitedly and confidently taking the challenge, in the hope of relationships previously built being an advantage to both clubs and ESFA, the unfortunate requirement of acting as Referees Coordinator and Competitions Coordinator for 10 weeks, did not quite have the running ahead of the game mentality, hoped for. However, after attempting to have the referees ready for changeover (thank you to Branch Coach Jack Bell for assistance), it was time to give the Competitions portfolio, my entire time. And goodness, did we hit the ground running!

#### JUNIOR FOOTBALL

With no Junior Football Director nor Junior Council Chairs, to commence the season, it was incredibly advantageous to operations, when Julia Chernoukha took on the role of Junior Football Director, with the support of the existing ESFA Board. Julia is fundamental in our intent to move forward. Her team player mentality, has certainly assisted in all things ESFA Junior football. I thank her for her commitment, assistance and support this season.

Junior football numbers remained steady however, with the decision for U12 Championship only, to be competitive and U12 Division 2 (or coloured phases) and below to be under the MiniRoos umbrella, the amount of competitive games scheduled in juniors reduced. With an unprecedented amount of special time requests along with reduced and erratic field availability, to ensure all requests were met, was not always the miracle some expected it to be. To move forward with junior scheduling, special time request reasons should be limited and set times should be given to all juniors on Saturday and Sunday. This will not only assist with the draw being available pre-season for the entire season but would also assist with referee scheduling. That is a win for all concerned; Clubs, players, parents, referees. Game amendments will be limited in number per team over a season to ensure less disruption.

With Juniors increasingly responsible for majority of game amendments, these must be done in the appropriate time frame in accordance with Competition Rules and on the correct forms. We have worked in the off season to produce better formats to allow clubs to amend games. To be caught in a 56-email thread, is not ideal practice to ensure games are amended in time to not have a domino effect on match official appointments, often to the detriment of teams scheduled before or after the original match time.

Our U13s and U14s Competition was successful on many levels. There was a spirited cooperation between

clubs which aided and assisted ESFA throughout the season. There is always the odd glitch that hindsight can always fix, but all in all, footballers in this age group, appeared to enjoy their season. Regrading in the U13 and U14 competitions, was true cooperation between clubs, leading to a fairer competition for all.

With our U15 and U16 boys requiring further growth in numbers to ensure a healthy competition, we look forward in strategy to improve the competition within these age groups. With 8 team one division competitions and such variants in skill, it is always a hard task for the team struggling at the bottom of the ladder. We hope to be able to run more than one division in these age groups, even if this requires an amalgamation of the two age groups involved. This is also an age group where unfortunate disciplinary problems occur. While maintaining our duty of care to our adolescent players, we must also guide them through expectations and responsibilities to ensure their football is competitive and enjoyed on the football field, rather than an angry arena.

U18 boys was a healthy 10 team competition, however had its own fair share of concerns and issues. The HSC seemed to play an adverse role in the playing of football for many, as well as school holidays preventing a successful 10 team competition with matches needing to be scheduled and amended constantly. This must be taken into consideration for future U18 Competitions. There are several variable solutions to ensure this occurs, with 10 team Junior Competitions requiring a commitment from all Clubs as to how it successfully plays through a season or Junior Competition Divisions having a maximum of 8 teams. With ground availability and scheduling of finals series, a requirement of cooperation is a must.

Our G14 and G16 girls split, merged and split again, creating a scheduling problem and decreased finals series for some. All in all, however, our girls were on the fields week in and week out all playing and enjoying their football. We need to have a clearer path for our girls in ESFA with appropriate age divisions offered, to allow the skill level to be of a more even nature on our fields. This is reliant on Clubs with more than one team, grading correctly.

Season 2018 saw a growth in Women's Football, with ESFA able to offer 5 Women's Division from the commencement of season, rather than await the regrading scenario of previous years. With the unpromising ability to be able to run a G18 Competition in juniors, seniors set about ensuring the girls remained in the game. As this was an unprecedented



occurrence, the G18s were placed in Womens 4 division and some higher at their own request. The G18s proved themselves formidable amongst the AAW Division 4 and should the girls remain in senior football, the likelihood of rising in the ranks of Womens football is very real!

With teams withdrawing early and mid-season during season 2018 and all the different requests and requirements of the remaining 91 teams in competitive Junior Competition, it was a hard-fought balancing act to keep all players and clubs happy. However, a highly successful Grand Final day where we ensured all our Grand Finalists were treated to the turf and excitement of Hensley displayed the success of community-based football and high skill levels.

We were lucky enough to host nine Champion of Champions Junior home games in Round 2 of the Football NSW Tournament on the fine synthetic of Heffron. In Round 3, we once again were able to host two junior teams, which was a great experience for our players and referees.

With three of our Juniors reaching Quarter Final stage, Pagewood G12s and U14s and Dunbar U15, in the Football NSW Champion of Champions tournament, it was a pleasure to ensure that the majority of entered teams received a home game hosted by ESFA at some stage in their campaign. A reward for all the hard work to become Premiers in the ESFA Competition.

There are many areas of improvement required, including the tightening of due processes, for 2019 however, with the cooperation of all involved in Junior football, we believe the quality and brand of ESFA Junior football will increase. All Clubs should be part of this process by attending meetings throughout the season. There may be no room for recourse in 2019 if there is no representation from Clubs.

With no wet weather weekends required due to the incredibly dry season, we did have the rare occurrence of football free weekends prior to Finals Series commencing. Whilst not ideal, we always need to plan for wet weather to ensure all players are in receipt of an entire season of games. Without the strategy and competitions running every weekend, should wet weather force ground closures on too many occasions, harsh decisions need to be made. The fact there were

weekends free due to no wet weather, was actually a positive (albeit maybe not seen as such by the players!).

A new registration system will be introduced for 2019 and we are hoping a new Competition Management system to replace the "clunky" current system. This should alleviate several current issues.

I personally would wish to thank and acknowledge the patience and understanding of Junior Clubs. Your cooperation this season has been exceptional. We are not always able to say yes. However, we are always able to look at solutions and alternatives, before we say no!. A new role within ESFA brought its own expectations from clubs and myself, which at times were not always met due to circumstances that are not always foreseen. With learning comes experience, leading to 2019 with the preparation and knowledge necessary, for a successful season.

#### **SENIOR FOOTBALL**

A higher number of preseason trials from previous years, saw the majority of our Senior Competition Clubs well prepared prior to the season. Or so we thought.

#### Mens Football - Friday Night

The O35 Men Friday night Competition was successfully played out in 2018. With 6 competitive teams and the welcome new team provided by UNSW. This competition however, did have its fair share of on field and off field drama. It may be prudent to note, our Judiciary Rules and Penalty of Schedules will be tightened for 2019. There were more Judiciary Hearings held involving this competition than most in ESFA. This was certainly not limited to one Club. A number of players and clubs were brought in front of the Judiciary Committee. We hope all our Clubs have learned from season 2018. ESFA have learned lessons and will move forward with solutions.

This was the only competition directly affected in the Grand Finals by weather. Even though the Grand Final was scheduled on the synthetic of Hensley, a flooded pitch due to harsh and unforeseen storms of hail and intense rain, with lightning posing the biggest risk to players, did not allow the originally scheduled fixture to go ahead. This meant a delay of one week to the O35s for their Grand Final.

#### Mens Football - Saturday Competition

The Senior FMC consisting of Jaleh Shafie (Senior Football Director), Adam Gwynne (Mens Chair), Sarah Ferris (Womens Chair) and the Competitions Coordinator, met very early on in the process, prior to the office re-opening for business, as a precursor to season 2018 to ensure the Competition structure was considered prior to any preseason meetings. This particularly referred to AAM Championship and its individual requirements after the initial relegation of Sydney CBD at the end of 2017.

Sydney CBD were reinstated into the competition and an 11 team AAM Championship competition was proposed. A second draw was released based on the 11 teams. Unfortunately, after the commencement of the season and after negotiations to ensure the 11-team

competition moved forward, Dunbar Rovers withdrew. While all attempts were made by both Dunbar and ESFA to prevent this, a redraw of competition once again, was required in moving forward. This had an adverse effect on some previous ground bookings and all attempts were made to schedule within field availability parameters.

Promotion and relegation criteria for the continuation of the AAM Championship competition in 2019 had been worked on by FMC and the Board based on a ten-team competition, with an eventual document provided to Clubs in the penultimate meeting of 2018. AAM Championship clubs were asked to provide feedback to proposals. Majority of Clubs were not in favour of the proposed promotion/relegation system and wished to expand the Competition. A second postseason meeting with AAM Championship clubs added further details on both Clubs and ESFA requirements for 2019.

An AAM Championship Forum will be set up and Clubs will meet throughout preseason and season 2019 to broaden the prospects of the Competition.

Night game catch ups were scheduled in time by majority of Clubs, however, on occasion it was well backed up by ESFA booked grounds when washouts often occurred on a Tuesday or Thursday night.

The remaining Saturday Competitions evenly consisted of 10 teams in the three Saturday Men Competitions: AAM3 Sat, AAM5 Sat and AAM7 Saturday. This was an excellent outcome for all teams involved in these competitions. However, once again an unfortunate withdrawal by Easts in the AAM3 Saturday competition, meant a redraw and a subsequent bye prior to one complete round being played. With some promotions obvious for 2019, we look forward to Saturday Mens Competition expanding further in the future.

With all three competitions running successfully for the remainder of the season, we believe the Saturday Mens competitions are a triumph for community grassroots football.

#### Mens Football - Sunday Competitions

Grading for Sunday divisions, saw some Clubs pushed up more than one division and whilst there were some outcries, the tables for all divisions seem to justify the grading.

Sunday AAM1 was an 8-team competition at the commencement of the season, which pleased all at the top level Mens Sunday competition. Unfortunately, an unexpected late season withdrawal from Mascot Kings AAM1, meant another redraw. The deferrals created by State Cup entries, also played havoc with this competition. Coogee United should be congratulated strongly for reaching the final of The State Cup, proving the strength once again of Mens Football however, this led to a backlog of games at the end of the season and Coogee should once again be congratulated for hectically playing a vast number of night games as well as Sunday games, which saw them eventually become Grand Final Champions for 2018.

Stronger rules regarding amendment of games will apply to those teams entering State Cup and other Football NSW/FFA competitions in 2019. This will benefit the teams concerned as well as the ESFA League Competitions. The World Cup this year, while thrilling, also affected the scheduling of matches.

There were also withdrawals in AAM7 and AAM8. ESFA ensured each competition had at least 17 games scheduled across the season as the minimum.

When teams do withdraw from competitions, the amount of work this causes ESFA is enormous and this time is taken away from teams who have remained in the competition. The focus of Clubs and ESFA should be to ensure time is spent and used wisely for the benefit of all.

The O35 Division 2 competition was a great competition for many. We even had ex AFL professional players understanding that football is really the only game to be played, joining in the competition. We would honestly say the O35 Division 2 competition was the least problematic competition in seniors for 2018! There seemed to be a camaraderie between the Clubs and that made ESFA's job easy in overseeing this competition.

Our 45s men welcomed two new teams with the entry by Randwick City FC into the Competition and Dunbar Rovers entering their first O45 team. With 14 teams involved, a decision was made to create two 7 team divisions by Clubs. There was some opposition to this, although Division 2 in particular, showed the success of the decision to split. With both O45 Grand Finals going to penalty shootouts and as a duty of care to all within these competitions, there will in future be no extra time added to Grand Finals and matches will go straight to penalties if necessary. A rule will also be added that there will be no slide tackles allowed in O45 competitions.

With the Grand Finals seen as one of the most successful events in ESFA history, it was sensational to see our Senior Mens Competition Finals so well attended by enthusiastic spectators, with the Mens AAM Championship Reserve Grade proving to be the loudest and most exciting match witnessed for guite some time, in ESFA finals football!

The ESFA Mens Knockout Competitions were also highly successful. The introduction of a further divisional competition in the ESFA Shield proved a winner! Lions may have won their first trophy for quite some time in the final of the Shield! The ESFA Cup was won by Coogee United AAM Championship and the ESFA Trophy won by UNSW AAM4 (originally graded as AA5).

#### **WOMENS FOOTBALL**

With our G18s entering the Womens Competition, for the first time in ESFA history, we were able to run 5 Womens Divisions from the commencement of season with no splits in competitions necessary for the entire season, proving Womens football is growing in popularity and strength.

AAW Championship reverted to a six-team Competition. Disappointing though it may be, it was a fairer solution for 2018 and allowed a promotion

system for 2019 from lower divisions. While the Womens Championship League was won once again by Dunbar, it was Coogee who became 2018 Champions by winning the Grand Final. We are confident the Competition will be stronger in 2019 after assurances by Clubs within Division 2 of promotion. Recruitment and promotion is the key for both Clubs and ESFA in the top two divisions for Women.

Division 2 through to Division 5 had some minor tweaks during the season. The top two teams within division 2 and division 3 may appear to some to have been incorrectly graded, however this only deems to improve the divisions next year by moving teams up into higher grades. Clubs are aware and welcoming of the challenge!

Most of the G18s were placed in Division 4. From results throughout season 2018, it has been an exercise in understanding exactly where these young ladies should be placed if ESFA is in a position not to run a G18 competition again. The G18s are most likely best placed for Division 3 or 4. There should be no G18s entered in Division 5, which for the most part, should be a beginners or older players competition. Lions entered their first Womens team into Division 5 and with no prior statistics as to their skill level and with assurance they were beginners, they were soon shown to be excellent learners! South East Eagles were also likely perceived as incorrect grading, due to the inclusion of higher skilled players within their team. We are ensuring our criteria for registrations and grading is tightened for 2019. It is often recognised that players wish to play with their friends and the risk of losing them is often seen as higher than the risk of correct grading to our Clubs. We understand this, albeit supportive of changes to be made in regard to grading.

Overall, we were pleased with the Womens Competition in season 2018 and are grateful to all Clubs for ensuring Womens football is perceived as something new players wish to join. We hope to run the Louise Mazzaroli Cup (which has been on hold for a while). on February 2nd 2019 for O30s women. A further opportunity to promote the female game as well as trial new players and returning players to the game.

The truth of success, is always in the crowds and our ESFA Women's Grand Final Day had the most spectators through the gates for 2018. From 9:00am onwards, the stands were always full. Our biggest crowd was in fact the 9:00am AAW 5 Grand Final with the crowd roars being heard from Hensley over at Heffron Park! A testament to the Competition.

The ESFA Knockout Cups needed to be pushed to create a competition, although thankfully Clubs once again embraced the concept. Dunbar Rovers won the AAW ESFA Cup and newcomers to Randwick City, AAW3 won the Trophy. Randwick City AAW3 won the ESFA League and the Grand Final. A success for Randwick's first Womens team.

With four ESFA female representatives as Community Bid Champions for the FIFA Womens World Cup 2023 Australia bid, we trust the growth in female football numbers will increase dramatically surrounding this.



#### **CHAMPION OF CHAMPIONS**

In case anyone has been living under a rock, ESFA had 3 teams represent at the Football NSW Champion of Champions Grand Finals. Coogee United AAM Championship hoped to have the historic win of 4 trophies for 2018 following the ESFA Cup, League and Grand Final victories. Dunbar Rovers AA Women were looking at their 2nd trophy for the season as well as their 2nd Champion of Champions title. Dunbar Rovers O35 Men were seeking their third trophy for 2018 having won the League and the Grand Final.

History was made when all three teams won their Grand Finals. An incredible day for football in general, ESFA and the two clubs.

Coogee United AAM Championship winning four major trophies in 2018 is a feat to be respected, acknowledged and revered!

Dunbar Rover had two teams in contention and triumphed in both finals. This also is a highly credited achievement.

Sincere appreciation to all Senior Clubs for their constant and overwhelming support, understanding of football variables and my humour! If we all continue to work together toward a common goal, senior football in ESFA will be hard to surpass. See you all on the parks in 2019!

A special thank you to Jaleh for her constant and avid support along with healthy debate when necessary. A further sincere thank you to Sarah for her support and belief in ESFA Womens football and to Adam for his involvement and appreciated assistance in Mens Football.

Finally, I would like to thank the ESFA Board and the General Manager for their faith in allowing me to switch roles in 2018. The office team are all great to work with, especially when days and nights become longer and stressful. Team work is an essential part of any sport, including sport administration.

To all players who played in the ESFA Competition, we hope to see you on our parks again in 2019.

#### DISCIPLINARY DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The administration of Discipline and Judiciary within ESFA is a transparent process. The job of the Judiciary is upholding the parent body's (FIFA, FFA and FNSW) prescribed codes of conduct and relevant penalties. These are available on the FNSW website.

#### Essentially, the Judiciary is a 3-step process.

This year the Judiciary reviewed 260 Player Send • Off Reports and 181 Other Incident Reports (breaches of rules or offences not involving play or players). As one would expect the majority of these occurred in senior games, however, there was also a number of send offs in upper aged Junior competitions. When divided by the number of senior games conducted by ESFA in 2018, (1915) there is a player dismissed in approximately one in every 7.3 matches. The breakdown of player send offs are:

- 94 2nd yellow card in a match
- **78** Violent Conduct
- 37 Use of Abusive Language or Gestures,
- 28 Serious Foul Play
- 23 Denial Of Obvious Goal Scoring Opportunity

After reviewing the Player Send Off or Incident Reports, players receive a penalty based on the following criteria:

- **1.** The range within the minimum and maximum penalty prescribed by FNSW Guidelines outlined in the above document.
- 2. The person's previous disciplinary history
- 3. The person's post incident behaviour
- **4.** The circumstances of the match when the offence took place

Qupon receiving the written Notice of Suspension, a person or club is entitled to request a Hearing after lodging the appropriate fee. A Hearing is an opportunity for a person or club to offer information not contained in the Referee's or Incident Report in order to vary the penalty. Some matters are so serious they go straight to a Hearing. ESFA are fortunate to have a number of experienced football administrators to evaluate these matters at a Hearing. The Association is indebted to Jaleh Shafie, John Harris, Roy Belcher, Ron Ogilvie, Simon Phillips, John Sweeney, John Clayton, lan Walter, Jack Bell and Shereef Habib who volunteer their evenings to preside over hearings and to Caroline Oakes-Ash who ensures due process is followed with Notices and Hearings. The decisions made at a Hearing can be the subject of Appeal.

Like the rest of the Association, the Judiciary is a constantly evolving process. It relies on the key stake holders, Referees, Players, Clubs taking responsibility in order for it to function. A recurring theme from a recent survey of clubs, evaluating season 2018, is the quality and coverage of referees. And, since the beginning of time, a key challenge for the Association has been the recruitment and retention of referees. Caught in the middle of this, and at the pointy end of the Judiciary process, is the Match Referee and Assistants. The overwhelming majority of 37 red cards for Abusive Language or Gestures were directed at referees. Having read the transcript of most of them, it is hard to imagine this type or level of abuse would ever be directed at a player's employer, or the player's partner, or the bar staff at a hotel but somehow it is fair game on a football field. It is not isolated to our Association but seems endemic in our sport. Sports such as rugby league, rugby union, netball, AFL, have negligible levels of dissent and next to no level of referee abuse. Consequently, for season 2019, a number of initiatives are being considered to dissuade players from indulging in misconduct to begin with.

This will involve all the stake holders working cooperatively to, hopefully, solve problems before they occur, creating a more enjoyable player and working environment for everyone.

#### REFEREES COORDINATOR'S REPORT

It was always going to be a hectic start to the 2018 with my appointment as Referee Coordinator commencing less than two weeks prior to the start of the season and coinciding with the implementation of a new referee appointment system.



Level 4 Referee courses were held in February and March which saw 55 new younger referees attend but only seven attending the 'seniors only' course. It was decided to conduct another 'seniors only' course after the conclusion of the finals series but with only five people registering this did not proceed.

The pre-season seminar was held on Saturday 24 March at the Prince Henry Conference Centre, with over 70 new and returning referees attending. This was conducted by branch coach Jack Bell and myself and included technical sessions including changes to the Laws, foul interpretation and offside. There were also technical sessions held at the Kensington Community Centre on the first Monday of each month between May and August.

The 2018 season started in late 2017 with the decision made to transfer to a new web-based referee appointment system Horizon WebRef as opposed to the largely manual system Samson that had been in use for the previous nine seasons. The change of systems meant that the uncovered match process ("TBA" in Horizon) that had been previously available, was not able to be duplicated within the new system. The changeover also meant changes to the overall appointment process, as well as a new concept

regarding referees self-maintaining their availability and changes to appointment timelines. All this occurred within a few weeks of the season commencing.

The number of referees available to be appointed to matches this year was the major concern. While we had a total of 164 referees registered - 81 youth (18 and under) and 83 adult (over 18) - only 37% were available for appointment on Saturdays and 35% available on Sundays.

A combination of initial appointments and utilising the new automated TBA process (replacing the manual 'uncovered mattches' process) saw us maintain and, in some cases, improve our coverage of matches from the 2017 season. This TBA process was a success in many regards as referees who were not formally available for appointment could pick up uncovered matches on one or two occasions during the week. Finalising this process by 12 noon Friday also allowed Clubs time to source their own referee if needed with a certain degree of certainty.

The expectation of appointing match officials to Football NSW competitions including National Premier Youth and Girls Conference League competitions, impacted on our ability to cover both senior and junior matches in our own competitions on many weekends, particularly matches on Sundays.

The scheduling of senior and junior matches also had an impact on match coverage. Having two matches kicking off at the same time on adjacent fields is somewhat problematic especially when you have a single referee available for that time and venue. Similarly, late changes to kick-off times and/or venues after the nominated deadline of 9.00am Tuesday sometimes resulted in appointed referees not being available for the new time(s) and/or venue(s).

Referees are appointed to matches using a number of criteria, including the level of formal referee qualifications they hold, age and experience. Also added to this, are factors such as transport limitations, field preferences and other commitments (e.g. football, family, other sports or interests). So, the appointment process is not as simple as 'there is a game go referee it' as, quite simply, the referee may not be suitable to

officiate a particular standard of match. This is the reason there may not be a referee on a AAM1 match even though there is an appointed referee officiating in the AAW3 match immediately before. Also, only a few referees are capable of officiating in more than two matches on a single day.

The referees who officiated in the ESFA Grand Finals did so in a professional manner and supported each other during the matches at Hensley Athletic Field and Heffron Park. Thank you for all the referees who assisted with the Grand Finals and supporting ESFA staff on the day.

We setup a small technical group at the beginning of the season to provide some coaching support to members. This group included Jack Bell, Arthur Kringas and Anthony Kabbout. My sincere thanks to those three who assisted me during the season in so many ways.






### **PARTICIPATION BY LEAGUE COUNCIL 2018**




### **PARTICIPATION BY GENDER**




### **PARTICIPATION BY AGE CATEGORY**









